Use commas to set off nouns of direct address. The name of someone directly spoken to is a noun of direct address.

Did you call him, Carrie? Mark, are you listening to me? I think, Debra, that you have a good chance.

Use commas to set off most appositives. An appositive is a word or group of words used directly after another word to explain it or rename it.

The tree, a dogwood, was in full blossom.

Mary McLeod Bethune, the founder of the hospital, had been a teacher.

Nouns used as appositives are called **nouns in apposition**. When the noun in apposition is a short name, it is not usually set off by commas. (Although, it is not incorrect to do so.)

My old friend Earl is back in town.
